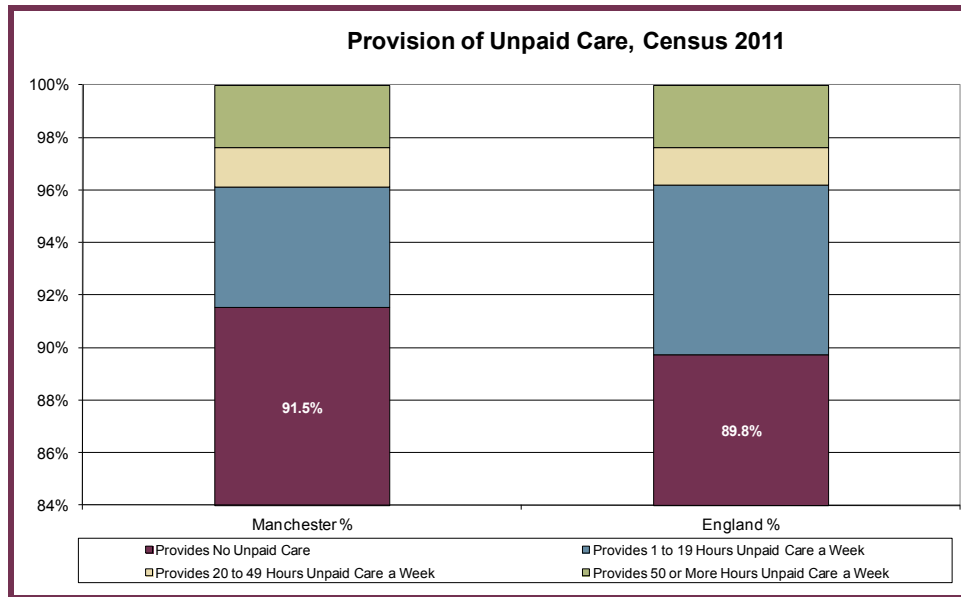


As the population ages, the demand for care is projected to grow with the result that people are increasingly likely to become providers of care at some point in their lives. This is an important social policy issue because the provision of unpaid care not only makes a vital contribution to the supply of care but can also affect the employment opportunities and social and leisure activities of those providing it.



A question on unpaid care was included in both the 2001 and 2011 Census. The same questions were asked in each Census, thus allowing direct comparisons to be made over time. Whilst the proportion of people in Manchester not providing any unpaid care remained broadly the same between 2001 and 2011, the extent of care being provided has increased, with a substantial growth in the proportion of people providing between 20 and 49 hours of unpaid care per week over this

Substantial differences can be found within Manchester in terms of the provision of unpaid care. The areas of Manchester that have the highest proportions of people providing unpaid care (13% and higher) are listed below. At the opposite side of the spectrum, there are 13 LSOAs where less than 3% of people report providing unpaid care. When looking at these figures it is important to remember that this measure is very strongly related to age and that areas with older populations are more likely to have higher rates of unpaid care than areas with younger populations, irrespective of the underlying levels of ill health in the area.
