Scoping Report Sustainability Appraisal

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Introduction

This Scoping Report forms part of the Sustainability Appraisal (SA) of the "Providing For Housing Choice" Draft Supplementary Planning Document. It should be read in conjunction with the Local Development Framework Sustainability Appraisal Scoping Report for the Core Strategy, which establishes a broad-ranging SA Framework. This overarching scoping report forms the basis for the SA of all other Development Plan Documents and Supplementary Planning Documents in Manchester. It is available electronically at: ----. For each Development Plan Document and Supplementary Planning Document, a brief supplementary Scoping Report will be prepared to meet the needs of each individual document which sets out how the SA Framework will be modified. The main ways in which it will vary will be in the range of SA Objectives and planning policies that are relevant.

The Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) will develop a number of the "Saved" policies in Manchester's Adopted Unitary Development Plan (1995). These policies seek to deliver greater housing choice within Manchester and in particular a greater range of affordable housing for all its citizens. The SPD will provide more detailed guidance to developers on how these principles should influence future development in the City.

Under the *Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004* (PCPA) all Supplementary Planning Documents must undergo a Sustainability Appraisal to determine whether there are likely to be any significant social, environmental or economic effects. The Local Authority is also required to make a determination under the Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Directive and SEA Regulations as to whether there are likely to be any significant environmental effects. In line with Government guidance on *Sustainability Appraisal of Regional Spatial Strategies and Local Development Documents* (November 2005) a Sustainability Appraisal will be carried out on each of the adopted UDP policies, which the SPD "Providing For Housing Choice" Guide seeks to develop, and a general appraisal will be undertaken of the additional effects of the Supplementary Planning Document itself.

The adopted UDP policies will be appraised as the do-nothing 'option', the other 'option' being to adopt the relevant parts of "providing For Housing Choice" as SPD. This Scoping Report relates to the appraisal of both these options, and a single Sustainability Appraisal report will be prepared to cover it. This will incorporate an Environmental Report to meet the requirements of the SEA Directive and SEA Regulations. The SA of the adopted UDP policies will be used to inform the SA of the SPD.

The Context

ODPM's final guidance on SA sets out the following stages required in relation to preparing an SPD:

- A1 Identifying other relevant policies, plans and programmes, and sustainable development objectives
- A2 Collecting baseline information
- A3 Identifying sustainability issues and problems
- A4 Developing the SA framework
- A5 Consulting on the scope of the SA

A1 to A4 have already been covered in the SA Scoping Report for the LDF Core Strategy, agreed by the Council in February 2006. The same level of detail is considered to be appropriate to this SPD. The Core Strategy will be the most broad-ranging of all the DPDs/SPDs to be prepared, and the sustainability objectives identified in connection with it are intended to cover the full range of social, environmental and economic issues that LDF policies will need to be assessed against. Stages A1-A4 will not therefore be repeated here. This Scoping Report fulfils stage A5.

The Scope

This SA focuses on the impacts of providing a broader housing mix and more affordable homes.

The initial scoping exercise in relation to this SPD and Saved parent UDP policies determined that there are potential effects in relation to only some of the SA Objectives in Table 1 of the SA Scoping Report for the LDF Core Strategy, agreed by the Council in February 2006. The process of arriving at and agreeing these SA Objectives is set out in the SA Scoping Report for the LDF Core Strategy. A list of these selected SA Objectives is contained in Appendix I. The objectives were selected on the basis that providing a better housing mix would not necessarily increase the total number of new houses over and above that agreed within the Regional Spatial Strategy allocation for Manchester. Additional social housing constructed as part of other Government or Council programmes will require additional analysis. Most objectives have some relevance to this SPD, but some of these will only be marginally affected by the proposed policy contained within the SPD. Where any doubt remained about their relevance, they were assessed. Some objectives were not considered because the scope of the policy would not impact upon them or consideration of the policy would not add to the analysis already concluded as part of the SA for the Core Strategy. Those objectives not considered are:

En3 Improve water quality;

En6 Protect and enhance sites, features and areas of historical, archaeological and cultural value;

Ec4 Encourage socially and environmentally responsible business in the private, public and voluntary sectors;

Ec5 Enable businesses and communities to benefit from the opportunities offered by ICT.

Providing For Housing Choice is supported by policies H1.2, H1.5 and R1 in the UDP. The Affordable Housing Policies Policy H1.5 will be appraised, but Policies H1.2 and R1 will not since they were considered as part of the appraisal conducted when the Core Strategy was considered.

The baseline

The baseline data used to inform this SA will be that set out in Table 2 of the SA Scoping Report for the LDF Core Strategy.

The appraisal

The appraisal methodology will be as set out in the SA Scoping Report for the LDF Core Strategy. The Appraisal team will consist of officers from Planning Strategy, Housing, Green City Team and Joint Health Unit.

Consultation

The SA Report will be subject to a statutory public consultation period alongside the Draft SPD for 6 weeks.
